


DT: Design and make a moon buggy

A moon buggy is a vehicle that astronauts use to drive on the moon, as it is quite tricky for astronauts to move around easily in their bulky suits. Did you know that there are at least 3 buggies that have been used on the moon and they were left there, so they are still there now!

We would like you to design and then build your own model moon buggy. It could be made from junk modelling, Lego, plasticine, modelling clay, anything you can get your hands on really!

It will need to have big, strong wheels to drive across all the bumps on the moon and you should think about how many astronauts you would like to sit in it. Oh, and give it a name too...


