




English 1: Poetry (see attachment)

Shared reading: Percy the Pirate

- 1) Read the poem together with a grownup; can you notice the rhythm?
- 2) Look at these tricky words: *marauding, ozone* and *pungent*. Can you find them in the poem? Using a dictionary, look up the definitions. There are lots of online dictionaries you could use such as: https://kids.britannica.com/
- 3) Can you find pairs of rhyming words in the poem? What do they notice about the rhyming pattern? In poetry we can show the rhyming pattern using letters when the lines of a poem rhyme they are given the same letter. The rhyme pattern of this poem is a b c b.
- 4) Can you find the rhyming pair *waft* and *aloft*? These words rhyme even though they end with different letter strings. Can you find other examples in the poem?
- 5) What do you think of the line 'His foes he would out-fox.' means? What does it tell us about Percy's character?
- 6) Have a look at the use of capital letters and full stops in the poem. How many sentences does each verse have?



English 2: Writing new verses (see attachment)

Have a go at writing your own verses for Percy the Pirate. Use the attachment sheet to guide you. We absolutely can't wait to see what brilliant verses you can add to the poem!

English 3: Performance – learn and recite!

So, how do you feel about learning a verse, or the entire poem or even your own verses and read out loud to your family or friends? We would love to hear you too, so you could get a grown up to video you. Remember to use lots of fabulous expression in your voices and don't rush! Enjoy the moment and speak clearly. If you don't fancy this one, feel free to find another pirate poem OR perform your own.

Challenge: Alliteration and Similes

• Alliteration is the repetition of identical or similar sounds at the beginnings of words. Can you find any examples of alliteration in the poem? If so, write them down.

- A simile is when two very different things are compared to each other using LIKE or AS.
 Can you see any similes being used in this poem about Percy? If so, write them down.
- Can you invent your own lines using similes, such as: The pirates were as fierce as... Their ships were like... Their knives gleamed like... Their cutlasses were as sharp as...

Now that you are <u>so</u> knowledgeable with alliteration why don't you have a go at creating some perfectly practical pirate sentences! <u>(see attachment)</u>


Maths: Unit and non-unit fractions


