What is the Early Years Foundation Stage?

The Early Years Foundation Stage (E.Y.F.S.) is the stage of education for children from birth to the end of the Reception year.

Throughout the year the Reception children play, make friends, develop and learn. They have great fun, exploring and creating and using their imagination indoors and outside. They gain independence and confidence and their natural curiosity is encouraged at all times.



Your child will be learning skills, acquiring new knowledge and demonstrating their understanding through 7 areas of learning and development

Children should mostly develop the 3 prime areas first. These are:

- 1. Communication and language
- 2. Physical development
- 3. Personal, social and emotional development.

As children grow, the prime areas will help them to develop skills in **4 specific areas**. These are:

- 1. Literacy
- 2. Mathematics
- 3. Understanding the world
- 4. Expressive arts and design.

Characteristics of Effective Learning

Playing and exploring- children investigate and experience things and 'have a go'.

Active learning – children concentrate and keep on trying if they encounter difficulties and enjoy achievements.

Creating and thinking Critically – children have and develop their own ideas, make links between ideas and develop strategies for doing things.







The first few weeks

- We have been finding out what the children already know and can do
- Reception Baseline (RBA) and our own baseline
- We will use this information to help us develop and extend each child

2.30: Tidy up and story time



Little Wandle - Phonics

Our school has chosen Little Wandle Letters and Sounds Revised as our systematic, synthetic phonics (SSP)



Phonics

- The children will learn the single phonemes.
- Digraphs 2 letters that make 1 sound

ll ss zz oa ai

Trigraphs—3 letters that make 1 sound

igh air

Tricky Words

- Words that are not phonically decodeable, e.g. was, the, I
- Some are 'tricky' to start with but will become decodable in Year 1 e.g. her, like

Phonics

- Correct pronunciation of sounds
- Correct vocabulary, blending, sound talk, chunking
- We all need to use the same language at home and at school
- Little and often is the key, does not have to be formal
- Link it to your child's interests

Reading Books

- Information will be sent home about reading during the next few weeks
- They will have a real book and a phonics book, this book has been carefully matched to your child's current reading level
- We will put a link on Tapestry to the words and sounds the children will be learning during the year
- Most children will have a non word book to begin with unless they know some of the phonemes and they can orally blend
- As time goes on the children will read in small groups with an adult.

- We use Little Wandle letter formation
- Fine and gross motor skills first...
- Learning to write their first and surname in our font

- Maths is also part of our environment and children access maths everyday as part of their play (Continuous Provision)

- Strong focus on subitising and counting skills

You will receive 1 written report about your child as well as updates from Tapestry.


How you can help
